From Pastor Raabe

The Heart of Worship

I have often said I am happiest when surrounded by books. I vividly remember the day when I got my first library card as one of the most exciting of my young life. In recent years, though, I've realized this personal saying isn't accurate anymore. The fact is that I am happiest in worship, with all of you, where we are seeking an encounter with the living God.

Books can tell us about God, or help us explore faith, or catalogue human efforts to fathom the divine mystery, which is of course beyond human understanding. But they cannot lead us directly to God. Only experience can. And it is the purpose of Christian worship to lead us into that experience through Holy Scripture.

I think one of the reasons organized religion has fallen into public disfavor is that too much emphasis is placed on teachings and dogmas and structures of authority (says the pastor who is teaching those dogmas right now to her Confirmation students). Actually, I believe people are desperate to experience God. They want to get to know God not as a set of precepts and judgments, but as the source of love that powers the universe, the divine love which set all things into motion, that which directs the stars in their courses and flowers within each human soul as the source of all creativity and life.

And why are we desperate to experience God? Because at some point we realize that God is the only sure thing in life. Everything else can fall away almost at a moment's notice. The security of possessions. The warmth of family. The comfort of a solid bank account. Hope for future. All it takes is a flood, or a death, or an uninsured illness, or a scary diagnosis to bring everything crashing down around you.

At Bill's recommendation I am just starting to watch the Netflix series *Maid.* At the end of the first episode the central character finds herself homeless. All she has in the world is one bag, a blanket, a few dollars and her small daughter clutched tightly in her arms. She makes her way to the ferry station (this is Washington state) and, utterly lost, settles anonymously up against a bare wall. Suddenly this wall becomes her entire world. It is all she has. But I am thinking even that is about to fall away. Surely she will not be allowed to stay, since it will become clear she is not waiting for the next boat. What about the next night, and the next?

This is the truth of the human condition that we all share. Whatever earthly security we have, you can't take it with you, as the parable of the rich fool in in Luke 12 makes clear. Martin Luther's famous last words were, "We are all beggars; this is true."

Where does that leave us? Also leaning up against a wall--but a wall that is always and forever, the wall that is Christ the solid rock. He who is our refuge, our fortress, the "crag" that will always catch us when we begin to fall. He whose arms are always around us, arms that we are sometimes not even aware of because we allow so much stuff to get in the way.

The goal and heart of worship is to lead you into an experience of the living God. Just as our social media are gauged to drive people to our web site, everything we do in worship is designed to take you more deeply into the Bible. Our hymns and liturgical movements are all scripture-based (some hymnals even give the specific references). The sermon always comes out of the lessons for the day, and the psalms take us directly into the reality of the human condition which transcends time and place.

My fervent hope as we enter the season of thanksgiving is that the act of the church in worship -- the singing of hymns and psalms, the reading and proclamation of the Gospel -- will invite you into an experience of divine presence through a close encounter with God's Word, one that always feels new and fresh.

From our Minister of Music

When I was a kid, there was something I received as a birthday gift one year. It was a cassette recorder. It kept me very busy because I could record myself or anything I wanted. My grandfather bought this for me and it became one of my favorite things over several years as a kid into my teens! As you may or may not know, I've been playing the organ since I was 11 years old. It was something I loved as a kid but I also loved doing "normal" kid things like playing outside with

friends, riding bikes and the usual things that ended me up at home needing to head for the shower and put on clean clothes before dinner. So that tape recorder was something I used often because I would record myself singing or playing the keyboard. I think I still have one of those tapes. Thinking back on why I loved the ability to listen to myself over and over, I realized that it wasn't because I thought I was ready to make a record deal, but rather that I could hear progress in what I was doing. You've all heard the phrase "practice makes perfect ". Well it does and it doesn't. The goal of practicing is to make you aware of what could be improved. I also learned that it doesn't make much sense to practice things that I could play or sing well, so I would skip over sections of music to the places where I had trouble. Working on the thing that needed the most attention. That is not easy to do because repetition can be very boring and if it's difficult, then it means really crunching down and paying attention to detail. It's like looking at something under a microscope. You can see things that only a very fine tooth comb can straighten out. Honestly, I don't know how I had such ability to focus, but I can tell you that I loved it.

What we do in music each week doesn't have to be perfect. The music the choir sings doesn't have to be spot on. What happens is that we come together because we love to sing. Our attention and focus is being together for a common goal. Of course we have the desire to learn something new without feeling like we need to go back and do it again and again. While we have places in music to improve, the overall experience in music is to sound forth from our bodies, our minds, our hearts, our breath, our inner voice. To be heard Cont.

and to be understood. The opportunity as a group of singers makes the whole thing feel like double the effort because each person has his or her own areas in the music that need practicing more than others. We have to let down our guard and expose our individual weakness and practice together on something that is now a group thing. So in the process of all this, we experience a group, a group goal, and the group sound becomes more and more unified. If I were to record many people singing with my tape recorder and listen to it over and over, I would find many things. We would, of course, notice the places where notes might be wrong, or it may be too loud, and that needs improvement. The one important thing I think we would find is that we breathe together! The very fact that we breathe together means that we are thinking the same thoughts, thinking about the next word, thinking about the musical phrase, thinking about only the music, but together! That is a wonderful thing to hear. It confirms that we have existed together and reached a new place in music, together. The result of this arrival is that we can do many things to make music alive. When we stand, lift our music in front of our faces, listen, breathe, project our sound and raise our voices, we sing because our love of singing is even that much bigger and stronger. It is "one voice" that makes that moment so very special. It is that one voice, the group sounds as one.. It is bold, it is courageous, it is caring, it is full of energy that broadcasts a message from us to you.

I hope that whatever you heard in music, whether it's from our choir, solos, instruments, etc., that you feel carried with us on our journey to love and praise God. Again, it doesn't have to be perfect, but it does have to be heard as "one".. In our hymns and liturgical music, together, we will sing and not be silent..
