From Pastor

From Pastor Raabe: Singing the (entire) story

I have heard it said, "No Easter, no Christmas." What does this mean? The other way around makes more sense, doesn't it? "No Christmas, No Easter?" After all, if Jesus had not been born, he could not have died and been raised.

Actually, "No Easter, no Christmas" is right on. We celebrate Christmas only because of the events of Easter, in which God's love broke

death's grip on the cosmos. At the moment of Jesus' resurrection love, not fear, was affirmed as the strongest force in creation. On Christmas we don't just welcome a new baby who grows up to be a wise teacher. We mark the birth of the Savior of the world, the one who gave his life to redeem our own as God's victorious expression that goodness is stronger than evil, life is stronger than death. Without this, Jesus would simply have been another prophet in the Hebrew tradition. And who celebrates the birth of Ezekiel, Jeremiah, or Isaiah?

This is why I love those carols and hymns that invite us poetically into the sweep of the entire story of who Jesus was and what of God accomplished through him. Every good hymn, another wise person once said, must tell this story in some way. Otherwise we are left at the manger wondering what all this news and noise is all about.

Richard Wilbur's hymn "A Stable Lamp is Lighted" does this superbly. You can read the text of this hymn and also hear it on a page located under the Worship area of our website titled "Christmas Message."

We begin standing outside the stable at the very moment Jesus is born, when the room becomes suffused with light that spreads to the far corners of heaven as the stars bend their voices to the miraculous event. In stanza 2 we are transported to the great procession on Palm Sunday, then in stanza 3 to the foot of the cross on Good Friday. This leads us to a posture of rapt wonder in stanza 4 as we ponder the miracle of Jesus' resurrection, before cycling back to his birth at the end with "praises of the child by whose descent among us the worlds are reconciled."

The hymn writer's craft is not only to tell a story but to invite us through arresting imagery to make it our own. Wilbur, who went on to become U.S. Poet Laureate, penned this in the 1950s but it languished in relative obscurity for 30 years until composer David Hurd gave it an evocative, sweepingly lyrical musical setting that itself seems to reach to the far corners of heaven. Wilbur's great poetic inspiration was to weave the four stanzas together with the repeated refrain, "... and every stone shall cry." In Luke 19, as Jesus is riding into Jerusalem with the "whole multitude of disciples" praising God with a loud voice, the Pharisees--who are always getting in his way--order the disciples to stop their clamor. Jesus replies, "I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out." Even the stones--the most apparently listless of God's creations--are, under their hard shells, actually alive with wonder and rejoicing at God's great work of salvation.

Even though Christmas is now past and the songs of the season have faded from the air, the larger message of Christmas follows us through the entire year. As we move into 2022 and gear up for all the challenges it will bring, let us continue to rejoice with the whole multitude of disciples through acts of love and compassion I look forward walking alongside you, individually and as a community of faith, as we lend our hands, voices and lives to God's great work of reconciliation.

From our Minister of Music

Over the river and through the woods... and a Happy New Year!

I bet it's safe to say everyone has a favorite Christmas cookie. Do you share or just go in for the taking? If a cookie were a piece of music, it might be a Carol. Do you have a favorite Carol? We don't usually sing every Carol in our hymnal (but very close). Do you know how many Christmas Carols are in our hýmnal? 31! However, "Joy to the World" is listed in the Advent section. English hymn writer, Isaac Watts published the hymn's text (paraphrasing the second half of Psalm 98) in a collection he called, The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament, 1719. He titled the hymn, "The Messiah's coming and kingdom." The text mentions nothing of Shepherds, Angelic Choirs or Wise Men. It emphasizes instead, the reverent but ecstatic joy that Christ's birth brought to humanity. The word of hope during Advent is that we know the Lord our King will bring a final and lasting justice and joy to our world. So its words may remind you that one day Jesus will rule the world with truth and grace and make known the wonders of his great love for us. The hymn could really be appropriate at any time during the church year in reference to a theme for the "Kingdom of God" The familiar tune, "Joy to the World" is thought to have been adapted by Lowell Mason, an American church musician, taking parts from George Frederick Handel's Messiah oratorio.

There is indeed a lot of joy at Grace! We have a lot to be thankful for in 2021. In this New Year we might carry over a few extra holiday pounds and set goals perhaps for a happier and healthier year. Whatever you decide is the right thing for you, consider not thinking of a year as just 365 days, but rather 365 opportunities for "joy". Whatever that idea brings to mind, may it include the "joy" of knowing you are loved and cared for in many ways. Through prayers, smiles, handshakes, signs of peace, sharing and caring in ways that each one of us is able to do for another.

I hope you know how much I care about you, Grace and Music Ministry. My very best wishes to all of you for a blessed New Year. I hope you had your favorite cookies this holiday or at least left some for Santa on his many trips through the white and drifted snow.
