CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

P. Friends in Christ, in this Lenten season we have heard our Lord's call to struggle against sin, death, and the devil—all that keeps us from loving God and each other. This is the struggle to which we were called at baptism.

Within the community of the church, God never wearies of forgiving sin and giving the peace of reconciliation. On this day [night] night let us confess our sin against God and our neighbor, and enter the celebration of the great Three Days reconciled with God and with one another.


Most merciful God,




Psalm Prayer

Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me." ²⁶For as often as you eat this bread and drink the cup, you proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

Gospel acclamation: Return to the Lord



Gospel: John 13:1-17, 31-35

P. The gospel of the Lord, according to John, the 13th chapter.

C. Glory to you, O Lord.

¹Now before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. ²The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper ³Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, ⁴got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. ⁵Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. ⁶He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" ⁷Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." ⁸Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." ⁹Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" ¹⁰Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." ¹¹For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

¹²After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? ¹³You call me Teacher and Lord—and you are right, for that is what I am. ¹⁴So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. ¹⁵For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. ¹⁶Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. ¹⁷If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them."





FOOT WASHING

The foot washing ceremony is beloved among Christians for the symbolism it represents of service, humility and equality practiced by Christ's followers.

The tradition goes back to the Last Supper when Jesus performed this ritual for the first time. The washing of the feet reminds believers that social distinction is unimportant. Christians think of all humans as siblings and, as such, equal to each other. You are invited to come back by the font for this expression of love as quiet music is played and sung. Once you are seated, you'll be invited to remove shoes and socks and extend each foot over the basin. Warm water will be poured and then your foot gently dried.


